Drums Along the Hudson® Inwood Hill Park - 2022

The Drums Along the Hudson Festival continues a centuries-old tradition of the northern tip of Manhattan being a key gathering place for Native peoples and their guests in Inwood Park. Called Shorakapok (edge of the river) in Lenape, Inwood was the site of the first oyster bar in the country and Lenape served up the tasty mollusks to customers of all backgrounds. The oysters themselves were the foundation of a valuable ecosystem that cleaned the waters and provided habitats for other marine creatures; they are almost extinct, but environmental activists struggle to bring them back.

Jumping ahead a few centuries, Shorakapok was the spot where the first American Indian Day was observed. Episcopalian Reverend Sherman Coolidge (1862-1932) was an Arapahoe activist, who joined with others in a push for a pan-Indian organization to both represent and celebrate Native peoples. He founded the Society of American Indians (1911-1923), forerunner of the National Congress of American Indians and on September 28, 1915, he issued a proclamation designating the second Saturday of each May as American Indian Day (AID) and urged Indians to observe it as a memorial to their "race." The first celebration took place in Inwood Park under the great


tulip tree, which became iconic of Indian New York. Over the decades, Native New Yorkers turned the annual serious event into a festive occasion, which for the past several years has been sponsored by Lotus Music and Dance.

Historian Reginald Pelham Bolton and Oklahoma Cherokee Marie Noemi Boulerease Constantine Kennedy, better known as Princess Naomi, collaborated on developing an Indian Village on this site to preserve Indigenous cultures. In 1926, Princess Naomi and other Native people moved into the village; it was advertised as a subway destination and became extremely popular. She helped improve the economic health of Native folks by developing an outlet for them to sell traditional arts in the onsite museum. Sadly, Parks Commissioner Robert Moses came along a decade later with a new design, which eliminated any Native presence. Although the Princess and almost a thousand Indians launched a protest and petitioned to convert the park to official Indian lands, they were evicted and the village was destroyed.

Today, Drums Along the Hudson preserves and celebrates the past, present and future of Native New Yorkers and the legacy of Shorakapok.

Katsitsionni Fox

Katsitsionni Fox is Bear Clan from the Mohawk Nation. She is an artist, educator and filmmaker. Katsitsionni was an educator in her community for over 20 years, teaching Mohawk Language, Haudenosaunee Culture, Art and Film.

She is a visual artist working in many mediums including, printmaking, mixed media, pottery and video installation.

Katsitsionni films share empowering stories of resilient Indigenous women. Her debut film was the award winning Ohero:kon - Under the Husk a 26-min documentary following the




journey of two Mohawk girls as they take part in their traditional passage rites to becoming Mohawk Women. Katsitsionni received the Jane Glassco Award for Emerging Filmmaker at the imagine- NATIVE Film Festival in 2016 as well as the Achievement in Documentary Filmmaking Award at LA Skins Fest in 2016. Her most recent film, Without a Whisper - Konnon:kwe is the untold story of how Indigenous women influenced the early suffragists in their fight for freedom and equality.

Hezues R

HEZUES R, Founder of the S.I.C. Film School and Chief Creative Officer of Creative Gods Agency, is a pioneering media entrepreneur. Latin Nation referred to him as a "Latino Mogul in the making." In 2014, HEZUES R was Honored by the White House

and President of the United States. He has also consulted to previous President's Council on Financial Literacy. HEZUES has a passion for the arts and advertising. In 2008, The United Nations and the Organization of American States selected HEZUES R to represent the US to 34 Countries. For two decades, HEZUES R has been saving lives and creating content around Social Impact.

Batalá



BATALÁ is an All-Women Afrobrazilian Samba Reggae Percussion Band.

Batalá, New York is the premier all-women, Black-led, drumming ensemble, bringing high-energy performances to the people of New York City through an engaging blend of cultural education and joyous entertainment. Batala is involved in activating partnerships, community building, and cultural awareness in New York City and beyond. The music of Batala originates in Salvador de Bahia, in North Eastern Brazil. Batala is an international co-ed organization with a giant Batalá family, and owes its existence to Giba Gonçalves, a drummer and composer from Salvador, Bahia, Brazil. Thunderbird American Indian Dancers

Established in 1963, the **Thunderbird** American Indian Dancers are the longest running resident New York City Native American Dance Company. Their performances feature a diversity of dance forms that reflect the group's multicultural tribal membership. Their mission is to preserve and perpetuate American Indian cultures and promote a more realistic understanding of Native American cultures through their performances and other



activities. In New York City, The Thunderbird American Indian Dancers have performed at the Museum of the American Indian, the American Museum of Natural History, the Metropolitan Museum of Art, the Brooklyn Museum, the New York World's Fair, Columbia University, New York University as well as at countless schools, churches and performance spaces. Internationally, they have toured Mexico, Canada, Israel, Europe and Japan. All of the money raised by the Thunderbird Dancers goes to a scholarship fund for Native American youth. To date, they have assisted over 200 Indian youth with their educational expenses. The Thunderbird American Indian Dancers conduct pow wows across the country during the summer season, a monthly pow wow at the McBurney YMCA during the winter and perform an annual benefit at New York's Theater for the New City.



Louis Mofsie is a Native American from the Hopi and Winnebago tribes. His father is from Second Mesa, Arizona and his mother is from Winnebago, Nebraska. He is a retired art teacher and taught for 35 years at the Meadowbrook Elementary School located in East Meadow, New York. Louis is a founding member of the American Indian Community House and served as the chairman of the board for over 15 years. Louis is currently the Director of the **Thunderbird American Indian Dancers**, the Dance Company he helped originate in 1963.

Dancing Crane Georgian Dance Theater

Dancing Crane Georgian Dance Theater is a group of dancers, singers and musicians that specializes in the dance and music from Georgia, the former Soviet republic, and is committed to studying and accurately representing folk traditions.

The Dancing Crane company has been active since 1996. The Dancing Crane Georgian Dance Theater is a result of Victor Sirelson's dream of bringing the beauty and wisdom of authentic and ancient traditions into his community and of building a bridge between this old culture and modern American society. With this aim in view, the ensemble has been formed as a unique mix of local talent and professional performers from Georgia.



Kalpulli Huehuetlahtolli



Kalpulli Huehuetlahtolli (K.H.) was formed on October 24, 2010. During their first year they worked at attaining traditional recognition from elders with in the Aztec dance tradition which has its roots in Mexico. They are representatives of Aztec/Conchero/Mexica dance in the North Eastern USA. The group has worked to preserve and to teach these dance and indigenous traditions.

Along with having participated in various workshops, presentations and symposiums with Rutgers University, Red Hawk Arts Council and many other organizations, K.H. hosts an annual ceremony every June since 2011 which brings brings together many leaders and members of various dance groups from across Mexico and the USA.

Allegany River Indian Dancers



The Allegany River Indian Dancers are a Native American dance group that showcases the traditional songs and dances of the Iroquois. The general performances incorporate many aspects of Native American culture. The Seneca language and culture pertaining to the origin of the songs and dances are shared in the program narratives. All performers wear traditional Native American regalia. All the music is performed live. The show is as educational as it is entertaining. Some of the highlights of the show include the Iroquois Smoke dance, a very fast contest dance. The Hoop dance is also featured. The Allegany River Indian Dancers have been thrilling audiences at colleges, museums, powwows, and festivals since the mid 1980's.

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

Korean Dance and Drums Songhee Lee

Songhee Lee was born in Pusan, Korea. She began training in modern dance at age 12, and won several major competitions while still in high school. In 1979, while majoring in modern dance at Pusan Women's College, she joined the Pusan Metropolitan Dance Company as an intern dancer. There she became interested in traditional Korean dance and began taking instruction from a number of traditional Korean dance masters, each of whom practiced specific kinds of traditional dances, such as Sung mu (Buddhist Monk Dances) and Salp'uri (Shaman Dances). Among her teachers were a number of designated National Treasures. Building on this training, Ms. Lee came to focus on creating a personal style of choreography that drew on both modern and traditional Korean dance forms. She developed a style of dance that managed to be both contemporary and timeless, international and Korean, intensely personal and deeply transpersonal.



Use of shoulders, arms, hands, heels, and less dependency on leg movement is the foundation of Korean dance. This elegant and highly stylized dance form consists of court dances, religious dances, and a variety of folk dances.

Kinding Sindaw Potri Ranka Manis

Kinding Sindaw is a cultural performance troupe founded by Artistic Director Potri Ranka Manis over 20 years ago and is currently a resident artist group at La Mama E.T.C. Our mission is to educate and enlighten communities about the complex history and cultures of the indigenous peoples of the Philippines, through elements of theatre, dance, music and martial arts.

Kinding Sindaw Through art, theater, cultural workshops and classes, Kinding Sindaw seeks to assert, reclaim, recreate and preserve indigenous Philippine culture and traditions. Participants in the workshops experience the richness, vibrancy, and significance of this culture to current and future generations.

Drums Along the Hudson 2022 Biographies



Tom Porter (*Sakokwenionkwas* or "the one who wins"), is a member of the Bear Clan of the Mohawk Nation at Akwesasne, an Iroquois territory located on the St. Lawrence River. He was acting Bear Clan Chief in the traditional longhouse movement, opposite the state-sanctioned Tribal Council and has served numerous positions on the Mohawk Nation of Chiefs Council for over 25 yrs. Tom Porter is one of the last generation of his people to be raised as a Mohawk speaker from birth. Like his ancestors, who listened to traditional stories during the long winter months by the fire, Tom was weaned on the teachings of his great-grandparents' and his grandparents' generation.


This unique background paved the way for him to become a champion for the revitalization of First Nations languages and traditions. Now a respected elder, he has devoted his life to educating both Native and non-Native people about the true history, culture and spirituality of the Iroquois or, as they prefer to call themselves, the Haudenosaunee.

Mr. Porter has been a nationally recognized figure in Indian Country since the 1960s when he co-founded the **White Roots of Peace**, a group of Iroquois Elders who toured the country sharing traditional teachings and encouraging Indians to embrace their respective Native traditions. Recognizing that Mohawk language and culture were dying out, he also co-founded the **Akwesasne Freedom School for** grades K-8, with a curriculum entirely in Mohawk.

Since 1993, Tom has been the founder, director and spiritual leader of the traditional Mohawk Community of **Kanatsiohareke**, located in the homeland of his ancestors, near Albany, New York. In 2008, Tom Porter published the book *And Grandma Said... Iroquois Teachings*, in which we get to see in print a lifetime of teachings and memories, in words direct from the heart of, in Doug George's words, "a person who has devoted his life to preserving the heritage of his Nation." Oren R. Lyons is a traditional Faithkeeper and Chief of the Turtle Clan and a proud and accomplished Native American who works tirelessly on the issues concerning Indigenous peoples in the United States and the world. He is a member of the Onondaga Nation Council of Chiefs of the Six Nations of the Iroquois Confederacy, (Haudenosaunee) consisting of the Seneca, Cayuga, Onondaga, Oneida, Mohawk and Tuscarora Indian Reservations. in northern New York State. Among his accolades he has received the Ellis Island Congressional Medal of Honor, the National Audubon Award, the First Annual Earth Day International Award of the United Nations, and the Elder and Wiser Award of the Rosa Parks Institute for Human Rights. He is deeply involved with national and international issues that affect native peoples and has represented them in many forums

throughout the world, including several at the UN focusing on the rights and status of indigenous peoples, the environment and sustainable development. He is Professor of American Studies at the State University of New York at Buffalo, where he directs the Native American Studies Program.



Patrick Riley -

Born in Tokyo, Japan and raised in Savannah, Georgia, Patrick graduated Atlanta's illustrious Morehouse College cum laude with a degree in Broadcast Journalism. He is currently based in New



York City as an independent producer, personality, and writer – recurring clients including HARPO PRODUCTIONS, OWN, CNN.COM, NBC, BET, "Motown: The Musical", "The Wendy Williams Show", REMY MARTIN, etc.

Kamala Cesar is the Founder and Artistic Director of Lotus Music & Dance, a center for multicultural, traditional performing arts. She is one of the few specialists of T. Balasaraswati's style of Bharata Natyam dance in this country and has been teaching since 1978. She has performed in Europe, India, the Philippines and the U.S. Ms. Cesar is Filipino and Mohawk Indian and resides in New York City where she teaches Bharata Natyam and directs Lotus Music & Dance's efforts to produce and promote multicultural programs such as Drums Along the Hudson. In 2002, Kamala was honored as Thunderbird American Indian of the Year.

Her multicultural programs and productions include Mohawk Heartsong: Journey Through the Longhouse, Eagle Spirit: A Tribute to the Mohawk High Steelworkers, The New York Ramayana, Asian Dialogue, Along the Caravan Route, Message of Peace, World in the City, Dancing Across Cultural Borders and World Dance Festival 2015. Her most recent collaboration with George Faison's Universal Dance Experience: Erasing Boundaries is being developed for a full length production.

In addition to her tireless activities in promoting and organizing Native American dance and cultural events, she has participated in the Mohawk Language Immersion Program at Kanatsiohareke in Fonda, NY from 1999 to 2005.

Carl Nelson is pleased to have co-created and co-produced Drums Along the Hudson for the last twenty years. Carl's expertise for creating synergies that reflect humanity and the arts is well-known in society and entertainment circles the world over. From intimate book-signings to full-scale performances, he is known for producing quality events that have heart. He has produced events nationally for the Southern Christian Leadership Council, The Congressional Black Caucus, The Dance Theater of Harlem, The Hair Fashion Group Against Domestic Violence, and



for Lotus Music& Dance. He produced his first Off Broadway play, "Miracle Rwanda," which toured the world. 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

In September of 2002, with a generous grant from the New York City Department of Cultural Affairs, Lotus Music & Dance established Drums Along the Hudson: A Native American Festival. It began with a traditional Pow Wow to celebrate Native American heritage and culture and to commemorate the Lenape people who first inhabited Inwood Hill Park, or Shorakapak ("edge of the water"). This event takes place annually with something new added each year – including a Shad tasting, a White Pine tree planting (the Iroquois symbol of peace), international dancers and drummers, Native American Education Initiatives. The first festival had about 400 attendees, but recent festivals have had upwards of 8,000 attendees. In 2009, The Mayors Office of NYC issued a Proclamation declaring Drums Along the Hudson to be an Official NYC Event!

Environmental awareness has become a festival tradition where attendees can learn more about practical ways to implement green living. Participating organizations have included the Audubon Society, Clean Air NY, Lower East Side Ecology Center, Hudsonia, the Council on the Environment of NYC and the Captain Planet Foundation. Attendees who ride their bikes to the park this year can have free bicycle valet parking.
